

Classics 121: Ancient Religion
AR/VR assignment (due December 6th)

Assignment:

New computer technologies are changing the ways that people can experience cultural heritage and historical monuments. One important technology is Augmented Reality/Virtual Reality (AR/VR) software and hardware that allows people to experience sites of significant cultural heritage at a distance and in more informed ways. This has lots of benefits – it can democratize access to cultural heritage, it can protect cultural heritage from damage done by mass tourism, it can reduce climate impacts from air travel – but also raises new challenges. How can we design rich and accessible experiences for AR/VR technology? How can we make sure that we inform the public reliably about past cultures?

Your assignment is to design a Google Expedition (using Google Cardboard viewer technology) aimed at high school juniors and seniors in the United States who are learning about ancient culture, including religions. You will need to make a thoughtful tour of an ancient sanctuary space (or spaces) that both allows the students to experience a place of important cultural heritage and accurately informs them about it. Given the focus of our course, your tour should show viewers how religion was part of ancient culture.

This assignment is funded by a UC Berkeley Arts + Design Initiative Creative Discovery Grant. This is towards the campus Discovery goal that more “undergraduate students engage in scholarly and experiential learning. All such efforts should challenge students to question, design, implement, and iterate toward a thoughtful and creative culminating product.”

Requirements:

- You will need to create a virtual tour of one of the following sanctuaries or spaces: Delphi, the Acropolis of Athens, the sanctuaries of the Roman city of Pompeii.
- The tool for creating the tour is Google Tour Creator. See the video instructions for a basic introduction to this tool. Make sure that you use this tool with your UC Berkeley Google account.

- The tour MUST include 3 to 7 “scenes” and a minimum of 15 “points of interest” (in total). You must also use at least 4 supplementary images as part of your tour. The tour will be graded on its design – you should carefully plan the tour and think about how to effectively introduce the ancient space to American students. Design is not just a matter of aesthetics – it is about thinking about how you can reach an audience effectively and informatively.
- You must also produce a Word document made up of the labels from your tour and a link to the tour. This document (excluding bibliography and footnotes) should be at least 1100 words long and include footnoted references to both ancient and modern sources. You will be graded on the scholarly accuracy and depth of your labels. The supplementary images should also be included as an appendix to this document.
- The assignment is due December 6th at 1pm – our class time.

Guidance:

- We will provide a set of basic resources for each tour. For each of the three sanctuaries, you will have a basic reading list and a map of the site. You may wish to do further library research, but make sure that you use reliable sources.
- Do view and review the sample tour of the Roman forum as a religious space that I have made – it should model the outcome that we are looking for – in fact, I believe that you can do even better!
- It is recommended that you first learn about your sanctuary and explore it both on paper and online. Try to understand what is visible now and what it looked like in antiquity. Try also to understand what people did there.
- Then you should start planning your tour. It may be worth doing this on paper first or perhaps by making a practice tour on Google Tour Creator. Ask yourself: what is a logical sequence for a visit to this space? What things do I need to tell the viewer about? How will I show the viewer how ancient people used this space?
- Make the tour carefully. Choose good points for a 3D experience of the space and carefully place your labels. Write clear informative labels (including use of correct grammar and spelling!)
- For the Word document version, make sure that the tour is the required length (1100 words) and that you have given appropriate references. You have the choice of formatting. Any consistent bibliographic/reference system is permitted – but it should clearly and consistently show which sources support your statements in the tour.

Due: December 6th 1pm.

Time Management:

You have several weeks to complete this assignment. Please use this time well and properly schedule time for this task. Do not leave the assignment to the final week of the semester; you will not have enough time left to properly learn about the sanctuary and find sources, produce a high-quality design of a tour and write clear labels.
